Flat entrance doors appeared to be a combination of certified timber fire doors and replacement composite fire doors. (NB. - from limited visual inspection, certification not seen; adequacy of installation not confirmed).

Sample inspection of flat 1 entrance door found it to be a certified FD30/S timber fire door. The door was installed with intumescent strips and cold smoke seals. The self closer for the door had been removed by the resident.

No other flats accessed at the time of the assessment.

Flat 5 entrance door was noted to have a defective letterbox installed. Although not a passing risk due to being recessed and having two directions of travel, the door is directly below the stairs 1st floor residents would use to evacuate.

Flats 3 & 7 on the first floor both pose a passing risk to residents escaping in the event of a fire situation and should therefore be fire resisting.






