1-7 Braunston Lane is a purpose built block of 4 general needs self contained flats set across 2 storeys. Flats 1-3 are accessed via the ground floor and flats 5 & 7 are accessed via the first floor. All flats are accessed directly from the means of escape without lobby protection.

The block entrance door opens into the ground floor lobby. this contains 2no flat entrance doors, the electrical intake cupboard and a door which leads to the rear exit via a small storage area. Stairs lead to the first floor landing which contains 2no flat entrance doors and a ceiling hatch which leads to the roof space void/loft.

Means of escape is via the stairs which terminate in the ground floor lobby. This in turn leads to the front entrance door, or the rear exit via the small store to the rear of the block. Both exits discharge immediately outside to places of ultimate safety.

The block operates a stay put evacuation strategy.

Emergency escape lighting was seen to be installed to the communal areas.

The building is constructed from traditional brick and block under a pitched and tiled roof. Internally the walls separating flats from communal areas were seen to be constructed from brick and block. The stairs and floors were constructed from concrete.




